In this third course of a four-course series you will receive a firm base in the scientific study of life through modified inquiry-based instruction. The course emphasizes cells, genetics and the evolution of life, interactions between organisms and their environment, and energy transformations.

Learning Outcomes: At the end of this course, you will:

- 1. Describe how energy and matter are acquired by animals.
- 2. Understand how living things grow and how traits are inherited.
- 3. Understand how the flow of energy and matter influences over time the evolution of living organisms.
- 4. Construct a sound scientific explanation using evidence from experiments and observations.
- 5. Be aware of the concept of student-centered learning.

Typically, the class relies on activities conducted by you with other students to collect evidence and construct your ideas about the topic in question. Unfortunately, this approach will not be possible this quarter. The general template for the class will thus be: offline work in your textbook supplemented with pdf files or other material as collected evidence, submission of some of this offline work as assigned by me (participation points), submission of assigned homework (homework points), class discussion during Zoom meetings (attendance points), and completion of three exams, including a cumulative final (exam points). The schedule at the end of the syllabus details all the assigned material.

To succeed in this class (and in life) you will need a **strategic mindset**: effort, perseverance, and continually asking yourself how you can improve. I strongly encourage you to read about this mindset on Canvas\Files\Resources.

Attendance: You should be present during Zoom meetings. *More than one absence will result in the loss of your attendance points (10% of your total grade)*. If you know in advance you are going to be absent, you should also contact me and let me know the reason.

Late arrivals: Zoom meetings will start on time (13:00 h). Late arrivals are greatly discouraged and will negatively impact your achievement in the course. *Over two late arrivals will result in the loss of your attendance points.*

Participation: Typically, the class relies on activities conducted by you with other students. Unfortunately, this approach will not be possible this quarter. Hence, you will submit via Canvas assigned pages form the textbook that show your work.

Homework: Homework will be assigned throughout the quarter. It should be completed individually, and must be your own work. The grading will emphasize completion and a little of correctness in the answers. More than two missed or late homework assignments will result in the loss of your points.

Late work: Due dates and times for assigned work are found in the schedule at the end of this syllabus. Work submitted late will receive a 20% deduction. NO work will be accepted more than one day late.

Exams: All exams will be online via Canvas, timed, and closed book. I will be trusting everyone unless they give me a reason not to. Exams will be due as indicated on Canvas unless you have a valid medical or family emergency excuse AND have previously communicated with me.
